'Teen Ink' Essay/Video Contest Honors Innovation

Do you watch *Shark Tank*, the critically acclaimed and multi-Emmy Award-winning entrepreneurial-themed reality show? Maybe you have a business idea that you want to pitch, or you've dreamed of running a company that would contribute creativity

and innovation to the business world. Often products or ideas are born out of necessity or grow from a seed that sprouts and takes shape on paper.

These are the scenarios to explore in a 2019
Entrepreneurship Essay Contest sponsored by *Teen Ink* and the Gifted and Talented Institute

(GATI). Submissions are due March 31, and the

winner of this competition will be announced on April 15.

Teen Ink, a national teen magazine, book series, and website that offers teens the opportunity to

publish their creative work (writing, art, photographs) and to express their opinions on issues that affect their lives has partnered with GATI and Gifted and Talented Silicon Valley Innovators (GATSVI) to hold an essay and video contest. Teens can submit their business ideas for a chance to win a full-paid tuition scholarship valued at \$7,995 that will cover the cost of a choice of

To enter the contest, a competitor should create a free account at *Teen Ink*, then plan to write a 250-word essay or produce a 60-second YouTube video clip using the following topic as a guide: *Pick a company. If you can be the CEO of that company, then "why, what, and how" would you bring innovation to disrupt the status quo?*

Once the essay or video is ready for submission, entrants should select the "2019 Entrepreneurship Essay Contest" checkbox in the category/tags field and upload their submission.

Contest organizers hope not only to reinvigorate entrepreneurship in America and to honor innovation with this contest but to encourage teens to imagine themselves as creative, self-made, multi-millionaire and billionaire tycoons, like The Sharks.

Ideas often start on paper, giving teens from all walks of life the chance to chase the American dream and potentially secure an opportunity for more training in a summer program at Stanford, UC Irvine, or UC Berkeley. At one of these California institutions, the winner will have access to world-renowned mentors and instructors from Silicon Valley's top companies, research teams, or marketing experts.

Full scholarship to one of the residential Silicon Valley or Silicon Beach camps includes tuition, housing, and board. It does not include airfare/travel to and from the camp.

Distributed through classrooms by English and Art teachers, and available in libraries nationwide, *Teen Ink* magazine offers some of the most thoughtful and creative work generated by teens today. *Teen Ink* is devoted to helping teens share their own voices, while developing reading, writing, creative and critical-thinking skills.

MT PBS Announces 'Won't You Be My Neighbor' Contest

For Montana's Public Broadcasting Service (MontanaPBS), February meant the highly anticipated launch of the Fred Rogers documentary, *Won't You Be My Neighbor*. This award-winning film shares an intimate look at the life and philosophy of America's favorite television-acclaimed neighbor.

To celebrate the launch of this film, MontanaPBS invites youth (Pre-K - 12) across Montana to take inspiration from the legacy of Fred Rogers and to create submissions for a writing contest that responds to the prompt, "What does it mean to be a good neighbor?" Submissions will be accepted from February 14 to March 14, with the winners being announced by email or phone in early April.

Entries will be judged in groups based on grade level (Pre-K, K, 1, 2, 3-5, 6-8 and 9-12).

MontanaPBS will announce one winner from each group for a total of seven exceptional writers from around the state. Because submissions from across the state are accepted, contestants need not to be present to win. MontanaPBS will, however, send winners a framed certificate along with a gift bag of PBS inspired prizes.

The 2019 Writing Contest is meant to complement the Indie Lens Pop-Up film screening. This is a neighborhood series that brings people together for film screenings and community-driven conversations. Featuring documentaries seen on the PBS series *Independent Lens*, Indie Lens Pop-Up

draws local residents, leaders, and organizations together to discuss what matters most, from newsworthy topics to family and relationships.

Writing contest submissions should be no more than 1,000 words (4 pages double spaced). Writing can be primarily art-based if a writer chooses and can include drawings, paintings, collages, 3-D artwork and photos, so long as they are created by the original author.

Although submissions can be on loose paper, bound, stapled or paper-clipped, contest officials recommend that writers consider ease and cost of mailing when finishing their stories.

Because MontanaPBS will scan all winning stories, having the stories paper clipped or with a single staple works best. They prefer pages that are no larger than 8.5 x 11 inches.

Teachers are welcome to submit one written entry on behalf of an entire class. This will count as one group entry. Teachers may also submit many entries from individual students, but they will require individual entry forms for each student.
